This **TOTEM POLE PROJECT** was a partnership between Chilkoot Indian Association and the Haines Borough Public Library.

## Purpose:

- ◆ Teach traditional carving skills
- ◆ Teach Tlingit language skills
- ◆ Tell the library's story using traditional Tlingit symbols and contemporary design
- ◆ Increase visibility of Chilkoot Indian Association's partnership with the library
- ◆ Provide a lasting piece of Tlingit art for the community
